At the FOSCL annual meeting on Sept. 13, a new slate of officers was approved for 2003-2004. New officers (shown left to right) are:



Over the past few years, the Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation has made grants totaling \$10,635,000 to construct and equip a new headquarters building for the Florence County Library. The new 80,000 square foot building is expected to open in Spring, 2004. The Foundation also donated \$300,000 to assist in the expansion of the Lake City Branch of the Florence County Library.

Friends of the Harvin Clarendon County Library Recipient of Outstanding Program Award

In 2003, the Friends of the Harvin Clarendon County Library raised \$15,000 at its major and very popular fund-raiser, the "Taste of Clarendon." 800 guests attended this event, now in its 15th year, to sample delicious delicacies from the best chefs and wild game cooks in Clarendon County. Money that has been raised at these events has been used to upgrade the library's automation system, acquire new library furnishings and book drop, and to support the library's summer reading and teen programs.

The Spartanburg newspaper provided \$40,000 in financial support and incalculable newspaper coverage to help sponsor the Spartanburg County Library's "Iollapalooza loop@your library," an annual bicycling event that features three routes of 25, 50, and 100 miles. Cyclists start from the main library and travel to the library's branches. In 2003, 150 cyclists from six states participated. The event promotes library use and reading, as well as a healthy lifestyle. The newspaper was also recognized for their ongoing allocation of valuable newspaper space for library events and information – the "@your library" column in the Sunday Life section, the "did you know?" weekly segment, and regular list of reading suggestions compiled by library staff.

Mim Woodring Recipient of Trustee Award

Mrs. Woodring was honored for over 40 years of sustained and tireless advocacy for libraries in Aiken County, particularly the Nancy Carson Library in North Augusta. Mrs. Woodring is the owner of the <u>Star</u> newspaper and has successfully utilized her newspaper, her deep knowledge of the community, and wide-ranging network to foster establishment and expansion of libraries in Aiken County. Mrs. Woodring has served on and chaired several library boards, including the Aiken County Library Board and the ABBE Regional Library Board. She also served for many years as a member of the Aiken County Council. She is a current member of the Friends of the Aiken County Library.

News from Friends Around the State

Friends of the Barnwell County Library (ABBE Regional): Friends netted almost \$27,000 from an auction of donated items held in August. Over 500 attended the auction featuring goods ranging from a 1990 Chevy pickup to USC footballs. Proceeds will be used to support upcoming projects for the Barnwell, Blackville, and Williston libraries.

Friends of the Fairfield County Library: Aynor, SC native R. Dean Johnson was the featured speaker at the library for a Friends sponsored program on Sept. 4. Mr. Johnson, a Celebrity Personal Assistant in Los Angeles, and member of the Board of Directors of the Association of Celebrity Personal Assistants, has authored a collection of humorous stories entitled, <u>Life. Be</u> <u>There at 10 'Til</u>.

Friends of the Florence County Library: Proceeds raised from an appearance of Garrison Keillor and his "Prarie Home Companion" program at the Florence Civic Center on Feb. 11 will be used to benefit the new Florence County Library main headquarters building.

Friends of the Lexington Main Library (Lexington County): Friends sponsored an "American Girl Doll Tea with the Catawba Nation" on Sept. 27, 2003 for children. Kaya, the library's newest American doll, depicts a Nez Perce girl. To help celebrate the occasion, members of the Catawba Nation presented a program featuring native dances, music and stories. The Friends have commissioned local sculptor Sissy Friarson to produce a bronze sculpture, "Circle of Friends", to mark the fifth anniversary of the main library building. The piece will depict long-time Lexington resident Edna Bedenbaugh reading to children. The sculpture, to be completed in Fall 2004, will be installed outside of the library's entrance.

Friends of the Pickens County Library: The Friends sponsored an "Independence Gala Preview Party" on July 3 at the Pickens County Library as a special treat for its members. Members had the opportunity to preview books to go on sale on the Fourth of July, as well to bid on 50 valuable individual works during a silent auction – all while enjoying refreshments and entertainment.

Friends of the Richland County Public Library: Well-known authors, including a former President of the United States, have made recent appearances at Friends-sponsored events. Former President Jimmy Carter autographed copies of his new novel, The Hornet's Nest, for over 1,000 people who lined up at the main library on Nov. 24. Terry Kay, best-selling author of To Dance With the White Dog, spoke at the Friends' author luncheon on Nov. 17 and signed copies of his latest novel, The Valley of Light. Over 50 persons attended an author luncheon featuring Kathryn Wall, author of Perdition House in Sept. The Friends' upcoming annual meeting on Jan. 11 will have Robert Morgan, author of Gap Creek, as its main speaker.

Friends of the Socastee (Horry County) Library: Friends have pledged \$1,000 to the library to purchase supply items not covered in the library's budget. The Friends are making preparations to open their new gift shop, "FOSL Finds," and have already garnered 22 volunteers to staff the shop.

Friends of the Surfside Beach Library (Horry County): The Friends sponsored a variety of programs in recent months. On Oct. 16, Bryan Wester of Coast to Coast Antiques provided appraisals of objects. On Nov. 20, Lei Aloha's from Inlet Square Mall provided tips on holiday decorating – Friends members put that advice to good use, helping to "deck the library's halls" on

Dec. 2. Graphologist Ann Meraglia is scheduled to present a program on Jan. 15. The Friends continue to sponsor used book sales the second Wednesday of every month at the library – book sales and donated volumes have doubled for these events over the past few years. **Friends of the Williamsburg County Library**: Friends sponsored a reception and book signing by two SC authors on Nov. 9. Columbia resident Beverly Leeper signed copies of her poetry collection, <u>Through My Eyes</u>, and Lake City native John "Fleet" Moody autographed copies of his novel, <u>The Black Bishop</u>, set in Charleston.

Program Speaker Provides PR Advice

Getting A's in P.R.: Essential Steps to Getting Coverage for Your Organization

ABILITY to recognize a good story. Look for local angles to a national story/program. Think about connecting your story to a national observance i.e. National Education Week or National Cancer Awareness Month. What's a new and interesting angle to your story? Consider what kind of "third party endorsement" you can get from someone who's involved with your organization.

ACQUAINTANCE with area media. Be familiar with the local editors, reporters, feature writers, producers, and news directors, and what they produce. Tailor your material to meet their needs. Since reporters' beats change constantly, keep a file of who is currently covering what at what paper. Also, find out how they like to receive material - email directly to their desk, faxed or mailed (some still prefer releases this way, believe it or not!), or sent through an electronic distribution service. Stay in touch even when you don't need something.

ANTICIPATE their needs. Be familiar with deadlines, know what kind of visual material they can use; work with photographers and camera crews to give them good material to shoot; facilitate the media's work in any way possible. Suggest photo ops or artwork and make your events visually appealing.

ATTENTION to detail when preparing material. Keep your style simple; put the facts up front; follow AP Style rules. Make your work as easy to edit as possible; it will increase your chances of your release running the way you wrote it. Bullets are always a good way to keep things simple.

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ACCURACY counts. Double check spelling, especially the spelling of names. Double check dates, and make sure that the day and date coincide. Before you send off your release, call phone numbers and key in Web addresses and email addresses as they are written in the release to make sure you don't have numbers or letters transposed. Get a second pair of eyes to proof your work.

APPEARANCE counts. If you're still preparing hard copies of releases, make sure they're single spaced, attractive, and eye-catching. Have a consistent style (typeface, letterhead) so that your release is immediately recognizable.

AVAILABILITY. Be available if the reporter or editor needs to call you to check details in your release. If you send a release and immediately leave town, be sure there's a contact name on the release other than yourself who will be around to take a call. Have instructions on your voice mail as to how to get in touch with you after office hours, in the event of an emergency.

ATTRIBUTION SOURCE. Establish ahead of time (like now) who the spokesperson or people should be at your organization. It's not a bad idea to have this in writing. Decide who takes calls from the press.

ASSUME NOTHING. Anything you or anyone else says to the press, whether you specify that it is "off the record" or not, has the potential of being used. Be sure that people from your station are aware of this whenever they talk to a reporter. Don't assume that a story will run just because a reporter has told you it will. There is always late-breaking news. Editorial space is not for sale. Remember you're competing with hundreds of other news stories every day.

APPRECIATE the media's efforts on your behalf. A sincere thank you note is one way to do this, though not all reporters appreciate that. Some may feel they don't need to be thanked for doing their job and a note may imply they did you a special favor instead of impartially covering the news. Of course, if they did do you a favor by covering something that might otherwise have been passed over, a line of thanks is in order. And a note that calls attention to a job well done is probably going to be welcome.
