From The President

Dear Friends –

As your incoming president for the next two years, I would like to briefly introduce myself. I am, unlike many of you, a relatively new Friend. I have been an active library patron for most of my adult life, but I came into contact with the Friends of Barnwell County when I moved there in 1997. Several years after joining their organization, I became involved in a trailblazing effort to move the county library headquarters out of an old home that had been donated in the 1950s. This mission mushroomed into the purchase and renovation of an abandoned storefront in downtown Barnwell for use as the headquarters library, the restoration/renovation of the historic Old Train Depot in Blackville, which houses one of the two county branches, and interior upgrades to the county branch in Williston, S.C. These projects are nearing completion, and I have continued to follow their progress since moving to Charleston in January.

I simply share this background with you to say that my history as a Friend is limited to this one experience. But, what an experience it has been! I truly believe that my involvement in it was a calling, just as so many of you feel your efforts on behalf of libraries are, as well. It has been evident to me as I've listened to some of you at Legislative Day, the LAMA Fundraising Institute, and some of the other events that we've shared this year, that you have dreams for your own libraries.

It is my desire and the desire of the entire FOSCL board that we share our varied experiences and take advantage of the resources available for the support of libraries on the statewide level. There are several ways we, as your umbrella organization, may be able to help: by offering guidance, information and networking opportunities through our website...www.foscl.org and our newsletter (provided as part of your annual membership); through institutes which we offer on a variety of subjects pertaining to our mission; by helping your Friends organization to identify your specific mission; and by recommending certain libraries around the state to you as places for your organization to visit for inspiration.

I urge you to renew your membership for the upcoming year, and join us in continuing to dream and realize great support for the libraries of South Carolina.

FOSCL Honors Library Supporters and Activists

One of the highlights of each annual meeting of the Friends of South Carolina Libraries (FOSCL) is the awards ceremony. Libraries, individuals, and friends organizations that are members of FOSCL nominate qualified individuals and organizations for awards in specific defined categories. Some outstanding programs, organizations, and persons were recognized for their contributions to libraries at the FOSCL annual meeting on Sept. 10. Award winners were presented with a plaque as well as a \$100 check for their local Friends organization.

FOSCL Public Service Award

SC State Senator Hugh Leatherman, Chair of the Senate Finance Committee

The Friends of the Florence County Library nominated Senator Leatherman for this award which recognizes elected officials who have significantly championed the cause of libraries in their role as government leaders. Senator Leatherman's support in the last 3 legislative sessions for increased funding for state aid for public libraries and allocation of educational lottery funds to support the DISCUS program and other library technology needs was crucial. In addition, Senator Leatherman was instrumental in securing a

sizeable grant for the Florence County Library to obtain a Pharos Horizon internet printing system. In accepting the award from Francie Dunlap of the Florence County Library, Senator Leatherman stated: "I will continue to be supportive of libraries...what better use of this lottery money than to be used for libraries."

FOSCL Business Award

The Friends of the Spartanburg County Public Library and the Spartanburg Public Libraries nominated this private business firm for its invaluable contribution in preserving the "priceless pictorial history of Spartanburg." When a long-stored collection of over 700 images of Spartanburg and surrounding areas was unearthed, local photographer Steve Fincher and assistant Carroll Foster realized the historical significance of this discovery. For over 2 years, they were involved in a project to preserve these photographic images. Steve Fincher Photography, with the approval of collection owner Lib Willis Fowler, presented the entire collection of negatives and digitally preserved copies to the Spartanburg County Library's Kennedy Room of Local History. The firm also prepared and donated 70 enlarged photos for display and use in the headquarters library.

FOSCL Outstanding Trustee Award: Marty S. White, Greenville County Library Board

The Friends of the Greenville County Library nominated Mrs. White for her many contributions to the library since her service on the Greenville County Library Board began in 1997. Mrs. White served as Chair of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, guiding the completion of the library's ambitious building program. Mrs. White also steered the Board's Operations Committee to engage the public, local leaders, library trustees, representatives of the media, and library staff in formulating policies relating to Internet use in the library. She also chaired the search committee for a new library director. Her active involvement and leadership in raising monetary support for the library has been ongoing. Beverly James, Director of the Greenville County Library, presented Mrs. White with the Trustee Award.

FOSCL Outstanding Program Award: Friends of the Florence County Library for Coordinating the Garrison Keillor Performance at the Florence Civic Center to Benefit the Florence County Library

Francie Dunlap, Development Office, Florence County Library, nominated the Friends of the Florence County Library, for their highly successful fundraising event to secure \$40,000 for an opening day collection for the new Doctors Bruce and Lee Foundation Library (headquarters library) in Florence. The staging of this event demanded a high degree of coordination and cooperation among several organizations and individuals, including the Friends, SCETV, the Florence Civic Center, the Florence Morning News, other local media outlets, and college students. Leslie Denton, Friends of the Florence County Library, presented the award to the daughter of Colonel Barry Wingard. Col. Wingard spearheaded many of the event's activities but was unable to attend since he is currently serving in Afghanistan.

FOSCL Annual Meeting Focuses on the Humanities

Library supporters met on September 10, 2005 at the Bostick Auditorium, Richland County Public Library, in Columbia for the annual meeting of the Friends of South Carolina Libraries (FOSCL).

Following welcoming remarks by David Warren, Director of the Richland County Public Library, and Guynell Williams, Deputy Director of the South Carolina State Library, FOSCL President Nonie Price recounted FOSCL accomplishments over the past year. She presided over the business meeting which included the Treasurer's report, minutes of the last annual meeting, and election of FOSCL officers. Gloria Avent, incoming President, presented Ms. Price with a plaque recognizing her years of service and leadership of FOSCL as both President and Vice-President/President-Elect. Mrs. Avent informed attendees about her background as a library friend and communicated her vision for FOSCL in the future.

Helen Fellers, Program Chair, introduced the program speakers – Dr. Walter B. Edgar, Director of the Institute for Southern Studies, University of South Carolina, and Dr. Randy Akers, Executive Director of the South Carolina Humanities Council and Current Chair of the Palmetto Book Alliance.

Dr. Edgar, author of [South Carolina: A History](#) and editor of the upcoming [South Carolina Encyclopedia](#), recounted the massive undertaking and rigorous

research necessary to compile an authoritative one volume encyclopedia on South Carolina. He informed the audience that the manuscript, which contains approximately 2,000 entries, 400 black and white photos and 40 color photos, and numerous original maps drawn specifically for the encyclopedia, has been completed. The University of South Carolina Press anticipates publication in Fall, 2006. Price for the 1,200 page volume has been set at \$69.95 with pre-publication orders (\$50 per copy) being accepted prior to Jan. 1, 2006 (ISBN 1-57003-598-9). The South Carolina Humanities Council led this project and contributed substantial funding for the encyclopedia. Over \$500,000 in private donations were raised to support the production costs as well. Visit www.scencyclopedia.com for further information.

Dr. Randy Akers, Executive Director of the South Carolina Humanities Council, addressed the group about the purpose and history of the Council. He specifically recounted the Council's past grants to support such public library-related initiatives as the "Let's Talk About It" series. He noted such award-winning humanities programs as the Beaufort County Library's "One County, One Book" featuring the library's collaboration with well-known author Pat Conroy. Dr. Akers also related information about the very successful South Carolina Book Festival (www.scbookfestival.org) which will observe its tenth anniversary in 2006. He informed the audience that the Council has recently hired a new Literary Arts Partnership Coordinator, Teresa Frost, who will be responsible for working closely with libraries to offer public programs. From Around the State – Friends Conduct Programs

Charleston County: Best-selling novelist Sue Monk Kidd, author of The Secret Life of Bees and the recently published novel, The Mermaid Chair, presented a program and signed copies of her books on June 16 at the library's main auditorium. Friends participated in the Piccolo Festival (held in conjunction with Charleston's Spoleto Festival of the Arts) by hosting the American Film Festival showcasing classic movies as well as an appearance by poet Lee Robinson, author of Hearsay, on June 4.

Florence County: The Friends sponsored a "Founding Donor Recognition Ceremony" on Aug. 21 at the main library. South Carolina Poet Laureate Marjory Wentworth spoke, and tours were offered of the library and its various donor areas with library staff on hand to demonstrate library services and resources. Almost 50 major donors to the new library were officially recognized for their contributions and support. Best-selling author Mary Kay Andrews, author of Hissy Fit, Little Bitty, and Savannah Blues, was the guest author at a morning coffee program on Sept. 14. An upcoming program on Nov. 20 will feature Aunt Pearlie Sue (Tales from the Land of Gullah) at the Children's Library.

Lancaster County: The Friends annual meeting on May 2 showcased guest speaker Amy Rogers, author of Hungry for Home. Ms. Rogers, an author, editor, and literary activist, was recognized by the Southeastern Library Association in 2004, receiving the President's Award for Novello Festival Press. Hungry for Home offers over 225 recipes by 165 contributors representing noted southern writers as well as home cooks.

Laurens County: Antiques were appraised by antiques experts Martin Meek and Hess Keitt at a program sponsored by the Friends on August 13 in the library's auditorium. Individuals could bring two handheld items to be examined, at a cost of \$5 per item.

Oconee County: The Friends partner with Our Daily Bread, a local soup kitchen, to place donated books in the kitchen for use by its clients. The Friends restock the bookcase on a regular basis. Joan Medlicott, author of the Ladies of Covington and the newly published The Three Mrs. Parkers, spoke at each of the library's three locations on May 23 and 24. Ms. Medlicott describes her books as "matron lit," and her most recent novel is set in Oconee County. She plans her seventh book in the Covington series for publication in summer, 2007. The Friends have planned a "Let's Talk About It" series for the fall carrying the theme, "Faith, Differences and Different Faiths," to be held at the Wahalla Library from Sept. through November. The programs are sponsored by the Friends and the SC Humanities Council.

Richland County: Author Andrew Carroll was the featured speaker at the Friends annual meeting on Sept. 11. Carroll discussed and signed copies of his latest book, Behind the Lines: Powerful and Revealing American Foreign War Letters and One Man's Search to Find Them. His volume contains letters written by soldiers and civilians in every major war in history, from both sides of a conflict.

From Around the State – Friends Raise Funds

Charleston County: The Friends held their annual “Bookfest” at the Gaillard Exhibition Hall in Charleston on Sept. 22-25. The sale opened with a special evening, “Celebrating Friends,” exclusively for Friends members on Sept. 22. The Friends also sponsor branch book sales each month at different branch library locations.

Georgetown County: The Friends held their big book sale July 14-16, attracting large crowds in search of a bargain. One buyer described it: “It’s like adult trick or treating.” July 14 was the Friends of the Library Night and accounted for almost 50 percent of the total sales. Proceeds from the book sale were used to help fund a children’s librarian position at the Waccamaw Library.

Greenville County: Friends will hold their Fall book sale on Oct. 21-23 at the Merovan Center. Funds derived from sales help to sponsor special summer reading programs for children, scholarships and other forms of support for library employees, teacher outreach programs, and more videos and audio books for library branches.

Oconee County: Friends host a used book sale the second Thursday of every month at the Wahalla Branch Library. Paperbacks are priced as low as 25 cents and hardbacks range in price from \$2-3.

Richland County: Several hundred library supporters filled the library’s auditorium last March to bid on themed gift baskets during the Friends’ major fundraising event – “A Tisket A Tasket – A Literary Basket.” This year’s event carried a “Roaring 20s” theme. A variety of items were bid upon, ranging from trips to vacation destinations, pig pickings, nature walk with naturalist Rudy Mancke, and palmetto foundry seals.

Director.

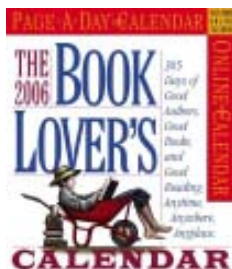

Getting and Keeping Members

The following article is from a "FOLUSA Fact Sheet".

There are basically two types of Friends members - "contributing members" who faithfully write a check every year because they want to support the library; and "active members" who serve on the executive board and/or are willing to volunteer for committee assignments and other Friends' projects. Both types of members are important - "contributors" because their money helps you help the library, and "active members" because they help with the work and leadership of the group.

- ◆ Define your mission and why people should join. Then be sure you make the case for support at every opportunity - during your membership drive, the Friends book sale, and all Friends events and programs.
- ◆ Set your dues so that membership is available in a number of classes, from a minimum (for seniors and students) to increasingly higher patron levels.
- ◆ Design an attractive brochure that gives members an idea of the group's purpose, and offers ways for them to become involved. List the types of committees and volunteer opportunities you have and be sure to call if they indicate interest. These new "active members" can become future executive board members keeping your group dynamic and fresh.
- ◆ Be sure that all programs you sponsor include an opportunity for the audience to become members of the Friends. These programs should entertain, educate, and stimulate the audience. Provide hospitality at every function, so that members and non-members are made to feel welcome.
- ◆ Have membership brochures available at the check-out desks of libraries, book sales and every other Friends function. Keep the community aware by notifying the media about the Friends' events.
- ◆ Membership benefits can include special ticket prices for events sponsored by the Friends and a preview night "for members only" at the book sale. A newsletter for members should be published a minimum of twice a year; quarterly is better, and monthly is best.
- ◆ Be prompt in sending out renewal notices. Let members know how their dues help the library and what the Friends have accomplished during the year.
- ◆ Solicit the business community to join. Have a special membership category for them and list their names so they receive recognition.
